Meet the team



Mrs Pearson has worked at the school for 14 years. She is responsible for the running of Maths intervention. She supports all year groups in Maths lessons. Ms Hird has worked at the school for 18 months. She is a 'literacy champion' and works with students on a 1-1 basis and in small groups. Ms Hird also supports teachers in English lessons. Forest School

This half term pupils have partaken in their normal weekly tasks of making drinks for each other, washing up, sawing and prepping wood for next terms activities. Additionally, the year 7 and 9s have been working on digging out a level for a platform to store the uncut wood on. They have been building fairy dens including underground bunkers and dens with outdoor swimming pools!

The year 8s have started to develop some of the vegetable patches and have dug out weeds and replanted trees. There have been some excellent examples of team work whilst digging out deep roots and thoughtful reflective thinking on the meaning of "setting down roots" within a community.

Both groups had a fantastic time making pancakes on 1st and 2nd March and making broomsticks to fly 'Harry Potter' style. They continue to show how well they can work together; plan and problem solve and stay focussed on a task until it is completed. These are all skills that students are taking back into the classroom.





Maths intervention

When pupils arrive in year 7 they undergo wide range achievement testing. These tests indicate to us pupils who may require extra support with their maths skills. Mrs Pearson provides extra intervention in small groups particularly with Y7 and 8. However she also partakes in one to one sessions with older pupils. Mrs Pearson also tracks the progress pupils are making regularly. The Maths content that is taught ties in with the curriculum and schemes that students have in their normal curriculum lessons.




