Excellent Attendance at School

Attendance at school is key to success. Our target is for every student to be in school for 97% of lessons or more – but 100% is best! At the end of last year, we celebrated those students who had managed 100% attendance over the academic year with a celebration event and rewards. Well done to those students! Let's see how many 100% success stories we can have this year.

Punctuality

In addition to being in school, it is important for students to be on time to all of their lessons.

The school day starts at 9:00am. Each school day involves a morning and afternoon session. Students should be on the school site by 8:55am and **in form for 9:00am**. If students arrive after this time, they are classed as late.

For form time, lesson 3 (after break) and lesson 4 (after lunch) there is a 5 minute warning bell to help students get moving on time. If they arrive after the bell for the start to the lesson they are late. For other lessons, students must move directly from one lesson to the next.

Every minute a student misses is a minute of learning they are losing out on, and these add up over the year! Being punctual is also an important like (and career) skill for our students to learn. Please talk to your child about the importance of being punctual.





Class Charts

We're pleased to announce that we have the new Class Charts software up and running at Carnforth High School. This allows pupils and parents to monitor their progress at school. Class Charts will allow pupils and parents to check attendance, behaviour (positive & negative), homework, rewards and extra-curricular activity. It will also automatically send out positive behaviour and detention notifications to parent email accounts as necessary. We are also looking forward to adding a communication module for two-way messaging within the next few weeks.

Pupils have already been given log-in details and have been encouraged to download the app onto their phone or tablet. The software can also be accessed via a web browser such as Google. Please encourage your child to sign up ASAP.

Parent invites with access codes and instructions were sent home with your child on Friday 8th September. The information is also on our school website, including a link to the Class Charts log-in page. Lost access codes can be replaced by contacting school.

Getting the Bus to and From School

Many of our students travel to school and head home on the busses. After school, the 5 (Morecambe), 5 (Overton), 55, 445 and 51 all collect students from outside the school gate. Our staff will be at the gate each day. Students who are walking home or being collected leave via the side gate and students waiting for the busses need to wait behind the main gate for their own safety. When busses arrive staff will allow the students onto the busses in an orderly fashion. Please remember that the busses are not run by the school but by Stagecoach, which is a private company.



Tickets and Backup Money

Students are responsible for their own tickets, whether they use a paper ticket or the online app on their phones. Bus drivers have already told us this year that they are dealing with students trying to board without a valid ticket or with a phone that has run out of battery. Drivers are being told by their company that they should not let anyone onto the bus that does not have a valid ticket. With this in mind they advise that students should keep £2 with them each day in case they cannot access their app or they lose their ticket and need to buy one.



Behaviour on Busses

We expect that our students will behave in line with school policies whilst waiting for and travelling on the busses. In many cases they are sharing these busses with member of the public. We work with Stagecoach in terms of behaviour on busses and parents are reminded that Stagecoach are within their rights to ban students from travelling on their busses due to misbehaviour. The guide to catching the bus to school on the next page has been provided by Lancaster County Council for further support.



Catching the school bus

Please behave sensibly and responsibly when travelling to and from school for your own safety. If you misbehave you may have your travel pass taken away or be excluded from using school bus services.

- Be at the stop 5 minutes before.

 Queue sensibly and keep well away from the kerb. Give a clear signal so the bus driver knows to stop. Make sure you are boarding the bus at the correct stop.
- Pay your fare and try to have the correct change. Keep your ticket to show the inspector and/or for your return journey.
- If you use a bus pass/season ticket, it must always be presented to the bus driver allow time for it to be examined. Bus passes/season tickets are not transferable and should only be used on the service for which they are assigned. If you cannot show a valid pass you must pay your fare. Lost or damaged passes can be replaced for a fee by contacting the County Council on 0300 123 6738.
- Misuse and fraudulent use of travel passes is treated very seriously and could lead to prosecution.
- Take your seat, please wear a seat belt if one is provided. Don't take up more than one seat. Place bags in the luggage compartment/under your seat/on your knees. Don't place bags on seats or in the aisle.
- If all seats are taken, you should stand sensibly behind the driver area and use grab rails where available. You should not stand adjacent to emergency exits, on staircases or upstairs on a double deck vehicle. Do not walk around during the journey.

- Antisocial behaviour/damage to the bus or anyone's property/bullying on the bus, is taken very seriously and can be reported to the police. Please report incidents to the driver, a teacher or a parent. Do not throw anything whilst on the bus, at the bus or from the bus.
- All bus and taxi services have No Smoking Policies including all e-cigarettes and vaping devices.
- 9 Respect others at all times and never distract your driver.
- Make sure you know which stop you are getting off at and to alert the driver by pressing the bell only once or asking them to stop at the next bus stop.

Never override past the bus stop you have paid for. Overriding could lead to prosecution.

- When leaving the bus please take the time to thank your bus driver.
- Remember to take all of your belongings when you leave the bus.
- Let the bus depart before crossing the road. Find a safe place to cross and remember: Stop, Look and Listen.
- DO NOT text/use your mobile phone when crossing roads. Remove ear accessories to allow you to hear any oncoming traffic.

The CHS Six




The CHS Six

- 1. Pupils will begin every lesson with a silent starter activity.
- 2. Teachers will clearly communicate the expected sound level of every stage of the lesson
- **3. Pupils** will be given a clear *purpose* at the beginning of every lesson.
- **4. Teachers** will use the hands up signal to gain the attention of their class.
- **5. Pupils** will listen to any instructions or explanations *respectfully* in silence.
- **6. Pupils** will pack up at the end of lesson as instructed and then wait behind their chairs for dismissal.

RISE - Reading for Inspiration, Success and Enjoyment

This week, Carnforth High School is proud to launch the newest part of the school wide reading programme 'RISE'. For an hour a week, all students are Reading for Inspiration, Success and Enjoyment. In previous years, students in years 7 to 9 enjoyed an hour a week of reading their own books and last year, every student in the school read in form time. In this year's fresh approach, Carnforth students are exploring exciting classic and modern stories whilst purposefully practising reading skills from across all of their subjects. Our students will read a different book each term and keep working on their cross-curricular reading skills in the sessions. Year 11's sessions will be slightly different in the spring term and will become Revision to Inspire and Succeed in Exams and will become extra targeted revision and exam preparation sessions. 

We have designed the Life curriculum to meet all of the Department for Education's changes in the past few years to relationships and sex education (RSE). As a reminder, it is also a requirement for us to let you know that if you do not want your child to take part in some or all of the sex education lessons that we deliver, you can ask that they are withdrawn. You will be asked to come into school to discuss this decision and we will grant this in all but exceptional circumstances, up until three school terms before your child turns 16, at which point they must choose for themselves. The CHS Award

It's important to remember that a student's journey through school has academic achievement at the core, but is much more than this. We endeavour to provide our students with a wide range of opportunities to develop themselves outside of their lessons, such as through the Duke of Edinburgh's Award (DofE) in year 9 and the CHS Award in years 7, 8 and 9

The CHS Award is modelled on the DofE and allows younger students to start learning new skills, helping their community, and working towards an award to recognise their efforts. The four elements they will engage with to receive the award are:

- Skills this means attending a lunch or after school skill club for a full half term
- Physical this means attending one of our many extra-curricular PE clubs for a full half term
- Experience this means taking part in something above and beyond the everyday
- Volunteering this means giving up time to support your community and good causes

Each time a student completes one of these elements the teacher delivering it will sign them off. When they collect all four elements they will achieve their Bronze CHS Award. If they get four more they'll earn their silver!

PLANS IN PLACE

A key part of our school vision is that our students will have clear 'plans in place' for their future. Developing this idea is our key focus in Personal Development this year.

- Year 7 and 8 need to understand how, at the beginning of their five-year journey with us, they are undertaking skills and learning that will help them identify their passions and dreams for the future.
- Year 9 need to understand the importance of the Options process to choose their KS4 courses, which they will undertake after Christmas, in forming their post-16 pathways and their future careers.
- **Year 10** need to start thinking about their Work Experience, which they will undertake at the end of this academic year, and how they need to consider and arrange placements that will best tie-in with their future plans.
- **Year 11** need to consider their post-16 pathways and know how to begin applying for the courses that best suit their future plans. These are a great way to introduce students to their different options. They will all receive one-to-one interviews with a Careers Advisor.

Our team, including our Assistant Headteacher for Personal Development, Mr McGauran, and our Subject Leader of Life Skills, Mrs Gregory, have a wide range of strategies in place to help students with all of the above. These include:

- Assemblies and follow-up form time activities each half term focussed on careers and pathways.
- Careers elements on each of our Enrichment Days this year our first Enrichment Day is in November and we'll have visitors discussing colleges, careers and employability skills.
- **One-to-one interviews** with every student in year 11 to help establish and support their post-16 pathways.
- A frequently updated website page on our school website
 (https://www.carnforthhigh.co.uk/school-life/careers/) which includes links to all local providers and other useful websites and videos for you and your child(ren).
- **Regular contact with parents** through this newsletter as well as emails updating you on local events of interest, such as Open Days at colleges.
- **Regular training for all staff** which helps them to understand the importance of linking their subjects and lessons to careers.
- Work Experience for all students in year 10.
- **Life Skills lessons** throughout the year in all year groups that build upon our students' Careers journey in age-specific ways.
- Our Careers-focussed software program called 'Unifrog' for all our students. This is an excellent piece of software that all students can access from our school website (Year 7 will be introduced to this for the first time on our November Enrichment Day).

British Army Careers

You may remember that a former student came into school at the end of last year to talk to some of our students that were interested in possible careers in the Army. Following on from that, six of our Year 10 students expressed an interested in finding out whether they would be able to pass the selection fitness test. Our very own Mr Green (former British Army EOD and current British Army Reserves) took them through their paces! The students completed deadlifts, ball throws and a beep test, in line with the army regulations. They left better informed, and committed to taking part in more training over the summer!









Cricket

The PE department are delighted to welcome all students back to Carnforth High School for the 2023/24 academic year. The first fixture of the year was a cricket fixture. School Transport and Fixture Payments

PE Department Standards and Expectations

The first PE lesson at the beginning of an academic year for all students is a recap of our department standards and expectations. Please find below some of the key messages which students received:

- Students are expected to bring full PE kit and footwear to every PE lesson. Failure to do so will result in a break time detention. Students will be expected to lend spare PE kit and take part in the lesson as normal. Refusal to lend spare kit will result in an S3 removal and an after-school detention.
- Should a student be unable to take part in their PE lesson due to injury or illness then students must provide a signed note from parent/guardian explaining the reason why. Students should still bring full PE kit and footwear for the lesson, as they will be expected to get changed, and take part in the lesson where the class teacher deems appropriate for example officiating. The exception to this rule is for students who are on crutches or in a cast for a broken limb.
- Students are expected to wear appropriate footwear for all PE lessons and extra-curricular activities. If a student's lesson is in the sports hall, dance studio or astro turf they must bring sports trainers. For any lesson on the field, it is expected students wear football boots. This is vitally important for rugby and football lessons.
- Students are expected to wear shin pads for football and hockey lessons and are advised to wear a mouthguard for rugby and hockey.
- At the start of every PE lesson the class teacher will offer all students the opportunity to hand in any valuables, which will be stored in safely in the PE office for the lesson.
- Jumpers and tights are never to be worn in PE lessons. School PE tracksuits tops are to be worn in cold weather.
- Jewellery is not to be worn in PE lessons.

Rugby Safety Policy

As part of the national curriculum delivered here at Carnforth High School your child will complete a unit of work on Rugby. At Carnforth High School we insist on Rugby being played safely and following RFU (Rugby Football Union) guidelines both in lesson and at extracurricular clubs. To help pupils enjoy Rugby safely, all pupils are taught the basic skills as a priority. These include how to tackle and how to receive a tackle safely.

According to the RFU, Rugby participants in secondary school's report that they feel more confident, resilient and have developed the Rugby values of Teamwork, Respect, Enjoyment, Discipline and Sportsmanship.

To help keep all pupils safe we insist on rugby being played in the correct kit. The kit pupils require to play rugby safely is listed below:

- Carnforth High School navy blue PE kit
- Football/rugby boots
- Mouthguard (strongly recommended)
- Headguard (advisable)

Headguards and mouthguards can be purchased online or at sports shops such as Sports Direct. As pupil's welfare is of prime importance, I would like to draw your awareness to **HEADCASE**.

HEADCASE is the RFU's concussion awareness programme that aims to increase understanding and provide information on concussion and other related topics, including how to prevent and manage suspected concussions. The HEADCASE webpages have numerous resources including resources and advice for coaches, match officials, players, parents, clubs and schools.
