Enrichment Day 1

Each year we hold Enrichment Days – days when all students follow a different timetable to their usual lessons. Our first Enrichment Day this year is on **Wednesday 22**nd **November**.

On these days we offer our students different experiences, activities, lessons and talks to those they would usually experience in the classroom curriculum. The decisions around what we offer are based on feedback from our pastoral team, safeguarding team, Life Skills team and other staff in school. We aim to keep our students informed and up to date on a wide range of PSHE issues through expert speakers, as well as enriching their usual academic curriculum through events like trips.

As always, for Enrichment Day 1 there is a focus on Careers, with students in each year group in school having some careers-based sessions. These include getting access to our Unifrog software for the first time for Year 7 and an author visit for Year 8. We also have a wide range of speakers coming to see our students about important issues, including SafeNet, Lancashire Fire & Rescue, and Lancaster & Morecambe and Kendal Colleges. Staff in school are also offering some different lessons to normal, including a Christmas Calendar creation session. Year 9 will also be out on a Trip to Etihad Stadium.

Students **in school** should wear normal school uniform, including school shoes, and should bring their school bags and pencil cases. They will <u>not</u> need school books.



Enrichment Day Visit – Author Jill Clough

Students in Year 8 will be visited by Lake District based author Jill Clough on Enrichment Day. Jill is a former teacher, headteacher and educational consultant, and is now fulfilling her teenage ambition to write fiction. She will be talking to the students about careers linked to writing as well as helping them to develop their creative writing talents.

Jill's first published novel, 'Morph,' won the Lakeland Book of the Year Award for Fiction in 2019. 'Anna and the Snake Queen' came out in 2020, 'If Dreams Should Die' was published in 2022 and was longlisted for the Lakeland Book of the Year Award in 2023.

During her visit Jill will be bringing copies of these books, which she is selling for the reduced price of £5 each. More details about each book can be found below and this offer is open to students in all year groups, not just Year 8. If you would like to buy a copy of any of these books in advance, to be collected on the day, please do so via School gateway by Tuesday 21st November so the author can be informed of how many copies to bring. Alternatively, students can also bring £5 to school on the day.



Morph





SafeNet Enrichment Day Visit

Students in Year 8 are also being visited by SafeNet, who they already met in Year 7 when they learnt about Domestic Abuse on an Enrichment Day last year.

The sessions are discussion-based and can cover some quite hard-hitting ideas, but ideas that we feel it is important for our students to learn about and discuss.

The aims of the discussion sessions are:

- Developing critical thinking skills
- Understanding how society influences our thoughts and actions
- Developing resilience against negative peer influences
- Promoting respectful and empathetic behaviours

For this Enrichment Day the discussions will cover topic of Misogyny, and we are hopeful that those who take part in the sessions will find them engaging, thought-provoking and worthwhile.

Year 8 form tutors will be in the room during the SafeNet sessions to offer support, and members of the school's Senior Leadership Team and PSHE Leader will also be in sessions to speak to students, as well as offering a safe space at lunch time to continue any conversations as needed.

Student Success – Youth Speaks

Each year Carnforth Rotary organise a formal public speaking competition. This year's saw the Carnforth High School team travel to Kendal for the local heat.

Carnforth historically has done very well in this competition and this year's post-covid return showed CHS still are a force to reckon with. Our team of Bobby, Bella and Dan challenged, persuaded, and engaged the competition audience with a well-crafted speech displaying both wit and knowledge.

The roles and responsibilities for the competition are well-defined and very strict: teams of three present arguments and points of discussion before the speaker responds to a question from the judging panel.

We arrived at the venue and spotted the competition, all much older (and taller) than our Year 7 team, but they were not fazed by this. They had researched and practiced and were ready.

Our team spoke about Animal Abuse and specifically abuse of imported horses. The tone of young hopefulness was set through Bobby's gentle yet authoritative chairing of the team. He led skilfully into the main speech where Bella's passionate and heartfelt speech was well-crafted and delivered skilfully from memory.

Dan delivered a mature and dignified vote of thanks to the Rotary and the host, Stonecross Manor and to Bella for her speech.

Ably supported by Year 11 prefect Lexi, they were all a real credit to themselves and to CHS especially with Bobby winning best chairperson.

As seasoned speakers, they are now ready to begin preparations for next year.






PLANS IN PLACE

Careers Continues

Following on from our recent visit from Career North to Years 11, 10 and 9, and a range of visitors from post-16 providers, we continue with a further focus on careers on Enrichment Day 1 this week. Year 7 will be introduced to Unifrog for the first time and will complete the Future Skills Questionnaire, Year 8 will have a visit from a published author, who will talk about careers related to writing, Year 10 will have the launch of this year's Work Experience, and Year 11 will be getting their Action Plans from Career North (which will also be emailed home) and will have a chance to create their own CVs on Unifrog. These are important not only for job applications, but also for apprenticeship applications.

Sports Transport and Fixture Payments

The PE department is offering the opportunity for parents to make a one-time payment at the start of the 2023/24 academic year of £25 to cover their child's extra-curricular fixture transport payments.
