At the end of this week, on **Friday 8th March**, we will have our second full Enrichment Day of the year. All students will be off timetable (in normal school uniform) to undertake a range of activities and sessions. Year 11 Intervention and Revision Phase 1 Comes to an End

To support Year 11 students in 'chunking' their revision, and in planning for their mock exams and summer exams, we separated the remaining school weeks after Christmas into three 'phases.' Each phase contains 6 school weeks and a holiday period, and each has a dedicated intervention and revision plan within school. Phase 1 is almost complete, with a focus on helping students successfully complete and reflect on their mock exam series 2. **Phase 2 will follow on from that, starting on 11th March**, and will take the students up until the start of the summer exams. 
Year 11 Intervention and Revision Loyalty Card for Phase 1

All students in Year 11 have been given an 'Intervention and Revision Loyalty Card' as a way to incentivise their attendance at support sessions in school. Students need to get their teacher to sign or stamp the card every time they attend an intervention or revision session in Phase 1. Each in school revision session (lunch time, after school or small group sessions) is worth 1 stamp in the card and each half term session is worth 2 stamps. Achieving enough stamps in the card will result in rewards for students, including a gift card draw, free food and reduced prices on their tickets for the end of year prom. You can also look at their cards to see which sessions they have been attending.

Year 11 Intervention Success so Far


Our current 'phase' has been focussed on students building upon their mock series 1 results and getting prepared for the mock series 2. The programme has included lunchtime sessions, after school sessions and some in-lesson intervention, as well as extended core lessons for all. An excellent **87% of the students in Year 11 have attended lunch and after-school sessions**. We've been very impressed with our students' willingness to commit to the extra support available, and would like to thank our staff for offering their time so generously to support their students.

In addition to the in-school sessions, we ran mock exam booster sessions to support student revision over the recent half term. Eleven sessions were offered, with attendance at English, History and Geography being particularly high. Lots of students have been earning lots of reward stamps, but remember that the current reward booklet finishes at the end of this week. A new booklet will be given to students at the start of phase 2.









SparxReader Launch

Year 7 and 8 pupils have now all started using SparxReader for their English homework. Reading is one of the key transferable skills and research shows that improved reading leads to increased success across all GCSE subjects. Here are our tips for getting the most out of SparxReader:

- Reading carefully means you get the most points. If you rush, you will have to get a higher percentage of accuracy to move on. You also get more points for getting questions right first time.
- You should give accurate reviews for the book you are reading when asked, as this will help to update your recommendations for the future.
- Use the 'settings' to adjust the layout, font, colour and size of text to make it perfect for you!
- Break your reading up over multiple days you are expected to get 300 points a week, an equivalent to 30 minutes of focused reading, however you don't have to do it all in one go. Break it up into chunks if you need to!



PLANS IN PLACE

The Year 9 Options Process

We're currently in the middle of a very important time for Year 9 students – the first chance in their school careers for *them* to make decisions about which subjects they want to study! This is the Options process, in which students choose which GCSE and BTEC subjects they will be studying for the next two years, and will determine what qualifications they leave with, as well as what they do post-16 (such as college or Sixth Form).

Year 9 Parents' Evening took place last Tuesday, and Year 9 students were asked on Wednesday to let us know what subjects they were most interested in taking. Based on this information, we are now creating the 'Options Blocks,' which determine the choices available to the students.

Please note the following events and deadlines:

- **Monday 4**th **March** students will be receiving their Options Booklets. This contains information about all the courses available to them.
- **Tuesday 5**th **March** this is Options Evening. Students and their parents/carers are invited to attend school to find out more about the subjects on offer. There will be multiple presentations to attend on the night to help you and your child make the best decisions. The night begins at 5pm with a presentation in the Main Hall.
- Friday 8th March all students in Year 9 will have a lesson about the Options process with Mr Malone (the Options leader) as part of Enrichment Day 2.
- Friday 15th March this is the deadline for students to return their Options forms, indicating
 what they would like to study.

Work Experience

In the 2023/24 academic yeat, all of our **Year 10 students will be out on Work Experience Week from Monday 24th June to Friday 28th June 2024**.

Students need to organise their own Work Experience placements and are supported in doing this through our Unifrog platform, as well as lessons on organising placements, starting in November on Enrichment Day 1. The process involves:

- Students (with support from parents/carers) identify and make contact with potential employers
- Students enter the details of the employer that has agreed to take them on placement onto Unifrog
- Unifrog contact the employer to confirm that they have agreed to take the student and that the employer has relevant insurances in place
- Unifrog contacts the students' parent/carer to share the details of the placement and confirm that they agree to allow their child on the placement
- Unifrog contacts the school to confirm the placement once all the above confirmations have been received.





Girls Cricket – Chance to Shine

In the last week of January, the CHS girls cricketers were given the opportunity to complete the 'Chance to Shine' Leadership qualification. This allows the girls who have completed this course to help in assisting primary school cricket festivals and tournaments in the upcoming summer term. Well done to all girls who completed this. 
Indoor Athletics

The Year 7 and 8 boys and girls indoor athletics competitors represented our school in an excellent manner. All pupils completed their event well, and the behaviour of all was exceptional. There were some outstanding performances on the day in various events, including Theo achieving a jump of 2.18cm in the standing long jump, Harrison throwing over 8.5m to gain 1st place in the shotput, Ava gaining 1st place in the vertical jump, Eden gaining first in the standing triple jump with 5.35m, George gained 1st place in speed bounce with 76 bounces in 30seconds, and finally Jacob also achieving a 1st place in speed bounce with 73 bounces in 30seconds.

The overall standings were as follows: Year 7 Girls 5th, Year 8 Girls 6th, Year 7 Boys 4th and Year 8 Boys 2nd (by 5 points only!). The Year 8 Boys have now qualified for the Lancashire County Finals on March 20th in Blackpool. Good Luck to those students. There is now a lunchtime club running on Thursday and Friday lunchtimes for the Year 8 Boys to practice these events in preparation for the finals.









Year 8 and 9 Netball

The Year 9 and 10 boys football teams travelled to Queen Katherine School for a round of friendly football fixtures. The Year 9s lost 3-2 in an end to end game. Tom scored both the Carnforth goals. The first within seconds of the game starting to give Carnforth a lead. QKS fought back well to take the lead before a late Carnforth goal gave QKS some nervy moments.

The year 10s won 2-1 in a competitive but fair game. Both teams battled hard and had plenty of chances in front of goal. Both goalkeepers made a number of excellent saves to keep the scoreline so low. QKS took the lead when they beat the Carnforth back line to slot home. Mason, the player of the match, scored within moments of the second half starting. Mason found the back of the net following some good footwork on the edge of the area. With ten minutes left of the game Mason scored what turned out to be the winner with a superb solo goal. Some last-ditch Carnforth defending very late into the game helped to keep QKS at bay and seal a solid away victory. Both fixtures have set these two year groups up well for the upcoming district football leagues.



Year 7 and 9 Boys Football

Year 7 and 9 hosted Central. For the year 7s it was another match in preparation for the end of season tournament. The visitors took the lead after they beat the offside trap to fire low into the bottom corner. Carnforth responded well and scored four goals in 15 minutes. Goal scorers were Joe, Jacob and Oliver. Player of the match Jack scored twice, the first a superb finish into the bottom corner following a good cross by Joe and the second a bullet penalty into the top corner for the 5-1 victory.

The year 9's played a hard fought 1-1 draw against Central Lancaster High on a "mud bath" of a pitch. Carnforth opened the scoring with an Alex finish after a goal mouth scramble following a corner. Central equalised just before half time with a looped finish resulting from a through ball. Both teams played to the conditions well and had plenty of opportunities to win the game. Unfortunately, Carnforth couldn't convert their chances. A solid display, with many stand out performances – Nat was awarded Player of the Match.

Whistlers and Futsal Tournament

The newest competition for CHS to enter was the #letgirlsplay Futsal District tournament which was held at Kirbie Kendal school last week. Year 7 and 8 girls played in the 5 a-side futsal tournaments, and a mix of different Year 7 and 9 girls refereed the matches that were played.

The Year 7 girls Carnforth Cougars showed an excellent display of solidarity and worked well together as a team, playing this brand-new sport of Futsal. As it is very similar to football, they were able to use skills they had already, but had to adapt to some new rules e.g. using 'kick-ins' from the side line, instead of 'throw-ins'. The Year 8 Carnforth Cobras also faired very well and adapted easily into this new style of play too. With the overall results of the tournaments announced at the end, the Cougars came 8th, and the Cobras came 3rd place.

The referees from year 7 and 9 were challenged from the very first game, as they were the ones who had to enforce the new rules, (which were new to them too). However, they took this in their stride and grew in confidence as each game progressed. A special mention to Lexi, as she refereed all games independently, and was chosen by the tournament organiser to referee the Final. Well done Lexi.

Once again, a very well done to all girls involved, you have certificates from both your Whistlers leadership course, and for taking part in this #letgirlsplay Futsal district competition. These should be given out soon - possibly in assemblies soon.

Sports Transport and Fixture Payments

The PE department is offering the opportunity for parents to make a one-time payment at the start of the 2023/24 academic year of £25 to cover their child's extra-curricular fixture transport payments.
