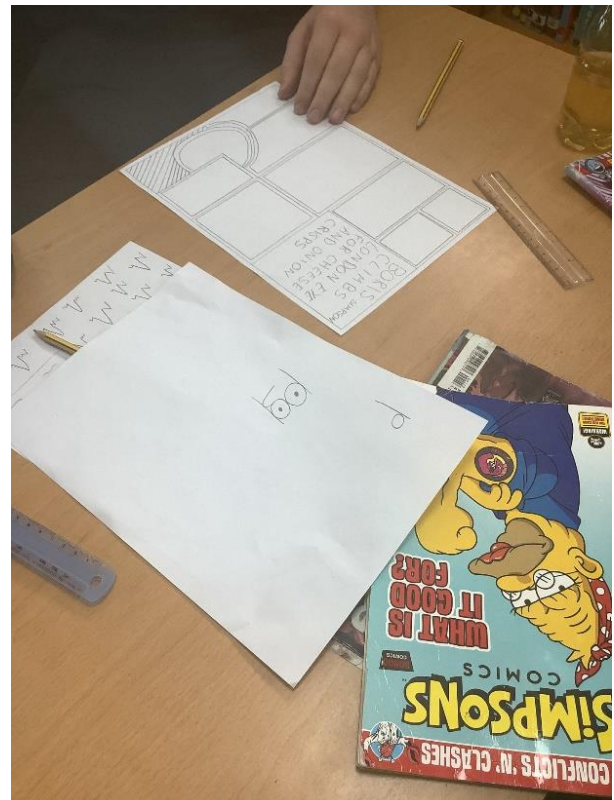
## Graphic Novel Author Visit

On Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> May, pupils at Carnforth High School were delighted to take part in graphic novelist and comic artist Kev F's "far-famed" comic art masterclass! Groups of pupils collaborated and worked with Kev to create a collection of their own comic strips after learning some of the secrets of the trade and overcoming any doubts they had about their artistic abilities.

Kev has written and drawn comics for everyone from Beano to Marvel, Doctor Who to Viz, Red Dwarf to The Dandy and all points in between for some years now. His first three graphic novels, Findlay Macbeth, The Prince of Denmark Street, and The Midsummer Night's Dream Team were inspired by three of Shakespeare's most well-known plays and were published in 2020. Most recently, he has used Richard III for the inspiration for his latest work.

Over the course of the two hours they worked with Kev, pupils created characters, decided which part of the character's story to tell, decided on a title for their collective anthology and had their portraits drawn by Kev himself. Whether the pupils aspire to a career as graphic novelists or love to read comics and graphic novels, they all got a peek into the creative process and were delighted with the finished collection, which they all got to take home.

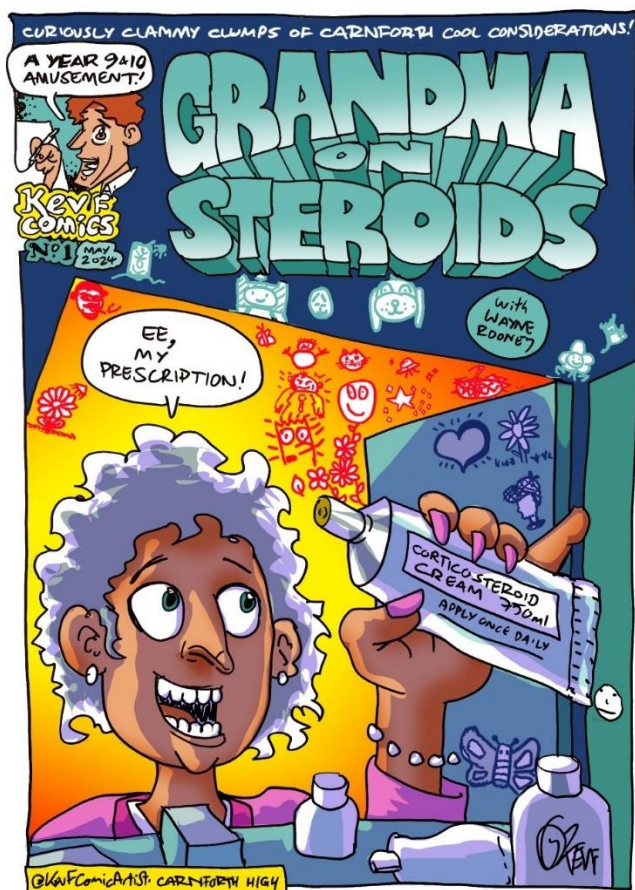
We look forward to inviting Kev back to work with more of our budding comic story tellers in the future.

# ROTARY YOUTH SPEAKS COMPETITION

## Youth speaks Competition

In April, CHS sent a team to the Rotary's 'Youth Speaks Competition' North of England Final. The goal of the competition is to engage young people with important issues in the world and to develop their skills in public speaking. Our three-person team of Bobby, Bella and Dan spent a great deal of time in the lead up to the competition completing their research and practising their delivery. Here's what Bobby had to say about the experience:

*"Our team of three researched and proposed a talk on the dangers of artificial intelligence (AI) for the Rotary's Youth Speaks Competition 2024. We were able to present at the North of England Final last month when we went to the Forest Hills Hotel in Frodsham.*

*When it was our turn, I spoke first to introduce everyone and explain how we were qualified to talk on the topic of AI. I personally research AI a lot as I'm interested in a career in games design in the future. My fellow team member Bella rides horses as a hobby and has researched AI to consider how it can support better animal care. Our final team member Dan is interested in learning lots of fun facts and has been researching how AI can help with this.*

*After this I invited Bella to come up and deliver her speech on the dangers of AI. She focussed on AI controlled vehicles, called 'self-driving cars.' Her made topic of discussion was around the ethics involved, in particular, what an AI vehicle would do if it had to choose between saving its driver from harm if it meant harming a pedestrian instead.*

*I then invited questions from the audience and other teams. We were asked a particularly good question with: 'how would you define intelligence,' but Bella managed to give a good answer! After this, Dan came up to give a vote of thanks, both to our hosts at the hotel as well as the Rotary, who organised the competition. Finally, we had a chance to listen to other schools give their presentations. They were very interesting, and a lot of them were much older than us, as we're in Year 7.*

*We didn't win this year, but we were all very proud of our performance against some very good and experienced teams."*





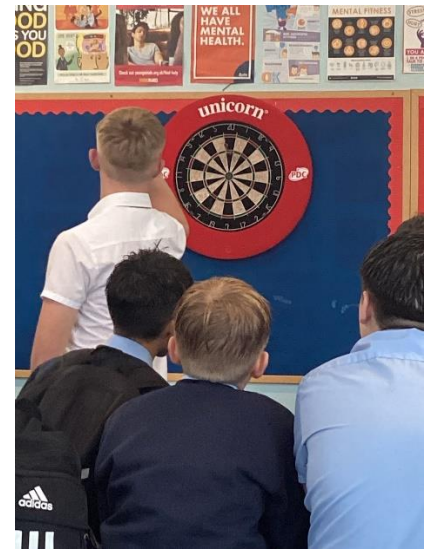
## **Performance Showcase Evening**

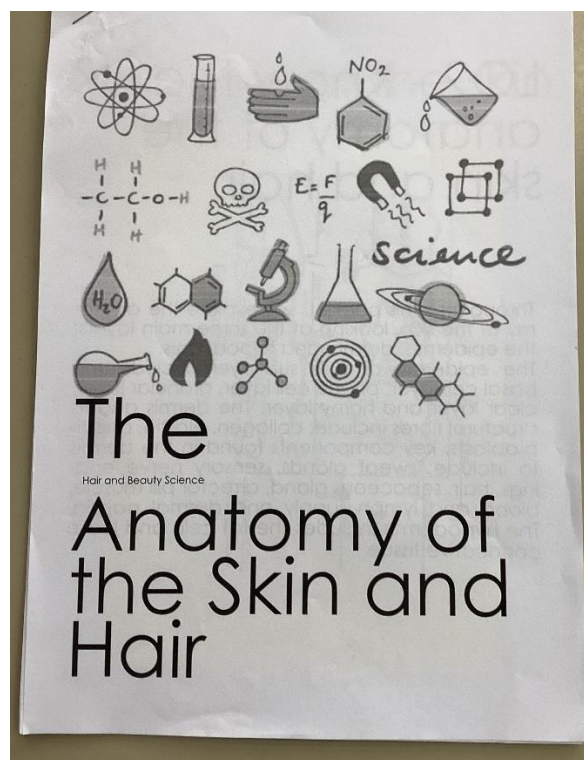
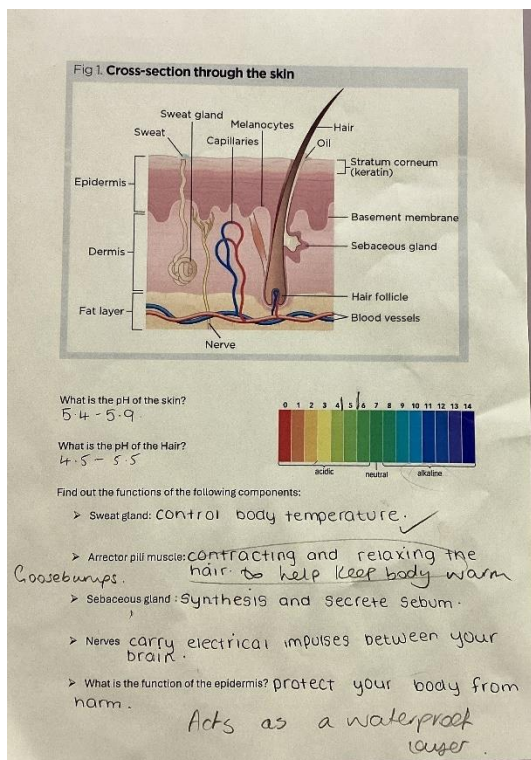


### **Blue Peter Badge Recognition**

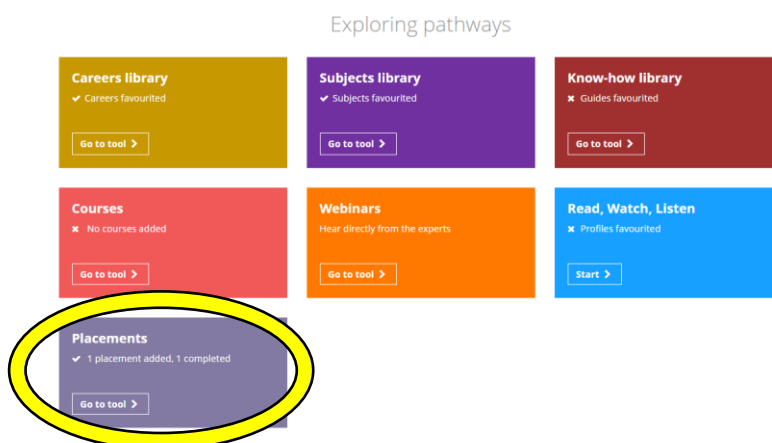
## Year 10 Work Experience Update

Please see below a copy of the letter sent to Year 10 parents last week about Work Experience.

We are now only around a month from the Work Experience Week of 24<sup>th</sup> – 28<sup>th</sup> June. The vast majority of students now have confirmed placements. **Students can see if their placement is fully confirmed** (or what stage it's at) by logging into Unifrog from the top of the school website homepage:



And then going to the 'Placements' tool:



If their placement looks like this, then the employer still hasn't responded to the email they've been sent and the student needs to chase this up with an email, phone call or visit:

Anyone who is not out on Work Experience for the week, or for any given day of the week, **will need to be in school for the usual school day times**. There will be English, Maths and Science lessons, plus some lessons around careers and career skills, as well as visitors to work with the students.

This is where the employer has provided key details such as the **times to be at work**, which can vary from place to place:

**Please note:** your child will need to check **which days** the placement is taking place, as some businesses (most often hairdressers) may be closed for one day during the week.

Employers will also have said **what to wear**. You may have to support your child is understanding this, as employers use terms like 'casual' and 'smart:'

Yes: Gloves and apron

**Please pay particular attention to the 'dress code' area** as some businesses require students to bring their own Personal Protective Equipment (most often steel toe-capped boots) in some work environments. Steel toe-capped boots can be found at Amazon for £15.99 ([Amazon steel toe boots](#)), Screwfix for £19.99 ([Screwfix steel toe boots](#)), Sports Direct for £24.99 ([Sports Direct steel toe boots](#)) and other retailers.



If students need to have something like this, then next week's half term is the ideal time to find it. If your child is in receipt of Pupil Premium funding and you would like to use this towards equipment or clothing for Work Experience, please contact me at [emcgauran@carnforthhigh.co.uk](mailto:emcgauran@carnforthhigh.co.uk) to discuss this.

## Calling the Employer

In a lesson about all of the above in form time this week we're advising that students check all this information (and make some notes) and then call the employer. This is the best way to ensure that they know the answers to the following in advance of their placement:

- What days they are working during the week
- What times they are working during the week (including whether they have an early start on the first day)
- What they need to wear
- Whether they need to buy/bring PPE etc., e.g. steel toe-capped boots
- What the lunch arrangements will be

If they need any support with this they can speak to me (Mr McGauran) or Ms Taaffe in our office across from T2 in the Technology corridor.

## After Half Term

In the week before Work Experience Week, each Year 10 group's Life Skills lesson will be dedicated to final preparations for the week, including how to behave on placement, what to know about Health and Safety, key safeguarding information and how to contact us for support at any time. They will also be given a workbook and pack of information to take with them to the placement, and will be visited on placement, where possible, by a member of staff from school within the first three days of their placement. I will write to you again closer to the time with more information about this.

Amy Speight from Tatham Fells primary schools emailed the school stating *"your netball leaders were fantastic, and their knowledge of the game was excellent. The students had a lovely manner with the younger students, and we hope to see them at the hockey tournament in a few weeks"*.

## **Track and Field Cup**

Four teams from Years 7 to 10 travelled to Stanley Park in Blackpool to take part in the English Schools Track and Field Cup. Students from Years 7 and 8 made up the junior boys and girls teams and students from Years 9 and 10 made up the intermediate boys and girls team. The standard of athletics on show was very high, with students from 12 different schools across Lancashire competing.

The format of track and field cup requires all students to compete in both a track and field event, with students awarded points for their performances based on their result against students from across the region. The standout performances from the junior girls' team, who scored 157 points in total, were Ava who ran a 3.05 minute 800m, to score 16 points. Paige scored 15 points in the 1500m, with a time of 6.28 minutes. Faith scored 12 points with a 6.04m shotput throw. The intermediate girls scored 129 points in total, Izzy top scored with 16 points in the 1500m with a time of 5.58 minutes. Amy produced an excellent run in the 800m, with a time of 2.57 minutes to score 14 points.

The junior boys scored 241 points. George and Theo both scored 17 points, George with a 28.1 second 200m and Theo with a 9.42m shotput. Blake scored 16 points with a 2.42 minute 800m. Joseph was close behind with a run of 2.45 minutes, winning him 15 points. Xavier scored 14 points on the javelin, with a distance of 21.54m. The intermediate boys scored a healthy 276 points. Alex scored a huge 20 points on the hurdles with a time of 13.0 seconds, Tom, Rob, Aidan and Toby all scored 18 points with their superb performances. Both Tom and Rob ran the 100m in 12.5 seconds. Aidan ran an 18.5 seconds 200m and Toby threw a huge javelin of 36.32m.

Well done to the junior and intermediate boys teams, who have both qualified for the regional B final. This is a fantastic achievement!





### **Year 9 and 10 Rounders**

On Monday 13<sup>th</sup> May, we took our Year 9 and 10 rounders teams to compete at Grammar in a friendly match. Both teams were keen with this being the first fixture of the summer league. The Year 10s played well with some excellent batting from Lena. The fielding was good with Lottie managing the team from second base. Unfortunately, the Year 10s lost but have some clear tactics to implement in their next game.

The Year 9 team blew me away! Their fielding was outstanding with Erin on second base making some excellent tactical decisions. Fantastic bowling from Elle who is new to the team this year. Matilda stole the game with some excellent batting scoring two rounders for the team. The Year 9s won 5 rounders to 3. A well-deserved win and I look forward to seeing how they get on this season.








## Sports Transport and Fixture Payments

The PE department is offering the opportunity for parents to make a one-time payment at the start of the 2023/24 academic year of £25 to cover their child's extra-curricular fixture transport payments. Currently the PE department charges £1 for home fixtures and £2 for away fixtures, this covers a percentage of cost for transport and competition fees, this will remain in place for parents who do not wish to make the £25 one-time payment. We believe that this for some parents will be a preferential method of payment for their child's sporting fixtures throughout the school year.
