We held our very well-attended 'Spotlight Showcase' on the evening of Wednesday 30th April. The event went well, with a whole variety of madness and brilliance!


Acts ranged from solo singing performances, small drama pieces and scenes from the Wizard of Oz, to a whole rendition of the Cinderella story in under 10 minutes!

The Trust regularly updates their policies, and have recently updated their data privacy policies, which explain how schools in the Trust protect all the data we hold on students, parents/carers and staff.



STEM – The Big Bang Competition Results!

As you may be aware from previous issues, 'The Big Bang' is a national competition which was entered this year by thousands of schools up and down the UK. Carnforth High School entered 5 separate entries to this. The pupils involved had to conduct a research project and write a report almost like a mini dissertation on their research and results. Over the course of around 12 weeks in total, Years 7-9 pupils worked away on conducting their projects.

A group of Year 9 girls including: Ellen, Chloe, Dusindi, Erin, Anne-Marie, Daisy, Carey, Irene and others worked on growing stem cells to create synthetic optic nerves to cure glaucoma. Harry, Harry and Ellis worked on a boat that they made in Technology which helps to clean the oceans and produce renewable energy. Dusindu and Ivan created a necklace which detects carbon monoxide. Lexie, Rosie, Emily and Madison created a dome which would protect towns and villages from volcanic eruptions. Ayla, Paige and Ava created a drone which acts for personal safety.


Unfortunately, none of our projects progressed to the next round but I just wanted to share some snippets of feedback we got from judges:

"Thank you very much for sharing your ideas with us! You captured our attention with your vision of a portable security drone – a clever and forward-thinking approach to personal safety. We were especially impressed by how you have combined existing technologies like GPS, facial recognition, and threat detection into one compact, flying companion.

Your idea feels very relevant in today's world, where personal security and convenience are both top priorities for many people. The inclusion of features such as an alarm system and scanning for threats shows great awareness of how technology can be used to keep people safe in a smart, proactive way"


"This is an incredibly impressive and science forward project. Being able to regenerate and transplant the optic nerve would be an amazing scientific breakthrough! If this technique can successfully work on the optic nerve, it could potentially open doors to regenerating other nerves in the body that have been damaged, which would be a huge step forward in medical science."







What's Happening in Class?


We like to regularly get out and about around school to find out what students are learning about and what skills they are developing. Below you can see what some of our students have been doing over the last couple of weeks.

In Year 10, students in English were working in groups to better understand one of the key texts they studied for their GCSE, Shakespeare's 'Macbeth.'






In Year 10, students in Health and Social Care were working hard to complete their assessments on Human Lifespan Development.

7 Weeks to Year 10 Work Experience!

Last week's Year 10 assembly was delivered by Mr McGauran and focused on our upcoming Year 10 Work Experience Week of 23rd-27th June. **This is only 7 weeks away!**

Work Experience was launched in November, so **students have now had 6 months to find a placement** for the week. At this time, only 16 students in the year are yet to find a placement, but **they still can**! There are also 40 students who have placements on Unifrog that still need the employer to complete their information. **Students (with parental support) need to contact these employers** to get them to add their information, such as insurance documents and risk assessments. Year 10 Boys Football

The Year 10 boys football team hosted Our Lady's, for the final league game of the season. Sat in second position before kick-off, Carnforth required a draw or win to play against Morecambe in the final. Carnforth took the lead when Nat beat the goalkeeper from 30 yards with a free kick. Our Lady's rallied and equalised soon after before taking a 2-1 lead at half time. The second half saw Our Lady's score three times without response to give them a 5-1 victory. This means that Carnforth slipped to 4th place in the district league table. A disappointing end to a very positive season for the team.



Year 8 Boys Football

The Year 8 boys footballers hosted Ripley St Thomas in the semi-final of the district football cup. Carnforth, who finished 2nd in the Morecambe area group, drew Ripley who won the Lancaster area group. Ripley took the lead in the first two minutes, and this set the tone for the game. Ripley were clinical in front of goal and utilised the space out wide on a large pitch. The final score was 10-2 to Ripley. Jacob scored the goal of the game at the end of the first half. Jacob dribbled the ball the entire length of the pitch, holding off several opponents before chipping the goalkeeper from the edge of the area. An outstanding piece of individual brilliance. Jack scored the second Carnforth goal, finishing neatly from inside the area. This result sees Ripley through to the final to face either Central or Morecambe.

Extra-Curricular Sport Payment

The PE department is offering the opportunity for parents to make a one-time electronic payment of £25 to cover their child's annual extracurricular transport payments. Currently the PE department charges £1 for home fixtures and £2 for away fixtures; this covers a percentage of cost for transport and competition fees. Parents will be able to make the payment on the School Gateway. It is hoped that parents find this a preferential method of payment, for those students who are regular team members, rather than paying in cash on the day of the fixtures.
