"I am very pleased to inform you that the majority of our students have returned to school in full and correct uniform. I would like to take this opportunity to thank students and their parents for their support.



## Key Attendance Information

### **Communicating Absence/Lateness**

Parents and guardians are required to notify the school if their child is absent or will be arriving late. Notification must be provided for each day of absence, including for medical appointments. Absences can be reported from 7:15am each day using a variety of communication methods. These options are outlined below:

We appreciate your support in promoting excellent attendance and helping our students develop habits that will serve them in their future careers.

### Leave of Absence Requests (LOA)

Guidance from the government outlines that unless there are exceptional circumstances, requests for leave of absence (including holidays) are <u>unlikely</u> to be authorised. Any unauthorised absence will be recorded on the attendance register and will negatively impact your child's overall attendance percentage. Parents/guardians are reminded that taking children out of school during term time without authorisation may result in a penalty notice;

- A £80 fine per child may be issued for unauthorised absence
- If not paid within 21 days, the fine increases to £160
- This applies to the first two offences within a three-year period for the same child
- Further unauthorised absences may lead to prosecution, with potential fines of up to £2500 and/or other legal consequences.

We strongly encourage families to plan holidays and travel during designated school breaks. Regular attendance is essential for your child's learning, wellbeing and future success. If you believe you have exceptional circumstances, please contact the school in advance to discuss your request.

### **In Memory of Mrs Reeves**

In June 2024 Mrs Reeves passed away. She spent 24 years of her life working at Carnforth High School. She was part of the Pastoral team for many of those years and loved helping and support people to reach their potential. She was also involved in many school Iceland trips and loved taking the students to experience new things. As a school we looked at ways to remember her and decided a sensory bench would be a really fitting way to remember her and allow her to continue to support our students in a different capacity. Although ambitious to raise the money, we decided we would work together to collectively travel the 961 miles between Carnforth High School and Reykjavik to raise the money.

During this time our staff, pupils and their families completed miles by running, walking, cycling, swimming and even skipping! This involved a park run with 12 staff, 1 ex-colleague and 8 students on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> January. It felt so lovely for everyone to come together in our mission to reach Iceland, and everyone was cheering everyone on despite there being lots of different abilities. Additionally, in school a number of students signed up to 'clock in' miles in the fitness suite. The students exercised tirelessly on the treadmills, ellipticals, bikes, rowers and stepper machines, throughout their break and lunchtimes during the week and collectively added 135.4 miles to the total!

As a school we were immensely proud of how everyone came together along with their friends and family to virtually get to Iceland and raise the money. In the end it did take us a little longer than a week to raise the money, however we got there a few days later and raised over £700.

Following this we spoke with a local company, Woodies, to complete the work for us. He produced a bench which is beyond anything we ever imagined. What a talented man! Once the bench arrived a group of staff have worked tirelessly to make it into a sensory bench. Another favourite place of Mrs Reeves' is Cornwall and Miss Dolphin put in many hours creating a masterpiece of Kynance Cove on the bench. Many others helped with practical and design support and then Mrs Moore finished it off nicely by planting some lovely flowers around the outside of it.

On Friday 16<sup>th</sup> May we invited Mrs Reeves' husband and son in to open the bench. The 'wow' reaction from her son said it all, and both are really happy that she will be remembered at the school for many more years to come.

### What's Happening in Lessons? – Science



### **Carnforth High School's Youngest Students Excel in Mathematical Thinking**


A selected group of our more able mathematicians in Years 7 and 8 sat the UK Junior Maths Challenge in May.

This is a UK-wide Challenge where students pitch their mathematical prowess in a number of numbercrunching and logic-posing problems.

15 of our students achieved either the Bronze or Silver certificate and were duly rewarded with the prestigious reward. Well done!

### Year 9 and 10 Careers Visit to the Royal Lancaster Infirmary


On Friday 6th June, students from Years 9 and 10 who are interested in future medical careers had the chance to visit our local hospital, Royal Lancaster Infirmary (RLI). The RLI is part of the University Hospitals of Morecambe Bay Trust (UHMBT), containing the RLI, Westmorland General and Furness General Hospital. Between them these three hospitals employ over 9,000 people, making them our largest local employer. In fact, the NHS is the 5th largest employer in the world, employing around 1.5 million people; this means it employs around as many people as McDonald's does around the world!

As part of our visit, we had a talk on the creation of the NHS and the development of the NHS Trusts, including how they are funded and work. Students had the chance to try a '999 Emergency Handler' task, in which they considered how to prioritise a range of different situations that a 999 handler may encounter. We also had a tour of the site, looking at different aspects of the hospital, including the emergency depart, the pharmacy and even the chaplain. We also had a chance to meet the site's engineering team, who took us to see some of the key areas of the site, including generators, boilers and the computer control room; we learnt that without these 'behind the scenes' operations the rest of the hospital couldn't function! In fact, 40% of all the people who work for the NHS are not 'patient-facing.'

To finish the day, we had a final question and answer session, where we found out key information about NHS careers, such as pay bands and the qualifications needed for the 350 different career roles that the NHS offers. The students on the trip did themselves proud, displaying our school values of confidence, purpose and respect throughout. Many thanks to the team at UMHBT for inviting us in!

### **Robotarium Workshop**

On the morning of Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> June, 23 pupils engaged in a seminar by the National Robotarium and Causeway Education all about career paths in robotics engineering. It was certainly very interesting to learn about different careers in robotics engineering and look at case studies about robots that are already being used to work alongside humans both in the UK and worldwide. Students also got to meet and talk to 'Ameca,' the most advanced humanoid robot that the National Robotarium are currently working on! The students are now spending the next couple of weeks completing a short project for the national robotarium following their webinar. There are definitely some future engineers at CHS! ### **Music News from Mr Barnes**


I am pleased to be able to offer students weekly private instrumental or singing lessons. A fantastic team of private peripatetic teachers are available for a wide range of instruments including drums, guitar and bass, piano, singing, strings such as violin and cello, brass and more.

There are a range of benefits to learning to play a musical instrument, such as enhanced problemsolving skills, communication skills, social skills, improved memory and lowered risk of dementia in later life, improved development of emotional regulation skills, promoting creativity and research by Oxford University indicates that studying an instrument to Grade 4 standard improves the GCSE results of students by up to a third of a grade in girls and up to half a grade in boys, helping turn 3s into 4s (a 'C' in old money) and 5s into 6s etc. On top of all of this is the greatest benefit of learning an instrument – being able to play the instrument.

Lessons are carried out one-to-one, meeting once a week on during the school day. Through lessons, students will learn how the instrument works and look at the mechanics of playing, whilst learning new repertoire in the styles that they are interested in. There may also be the opportunity for students to work towards exams within their playing, if this is something they would be interested in.

The lessons typically cost £30-£35 per hour dependent on the teacher in question, and lessons will be offered as 20 or 30 minutes per week and usually 6 lessons per half term. If your child qualifies as Pupil Premium, it is possible for the school to fund or partially fund these lessons.

# Year 10 Work Experience is Nearly Here!

We're now only one week away from Work Experience Week! It takes place from **23<sup>rd</sup>-27<sup>th</sup> June**.


School has worked with every student in the year to try to secure a placement for the week, and the vast majority now have a placement in place.

During their last Life Skills lesson, each student going out on placement has been given key paperwork to take with them:

- An Introduction Letter. They should give this to their employer on their first day on placement. It explains key information to the employer (which we also email out to them) including the need to contact school straight away if the student does not arrive.
- A Safeguarding Pamphlet. This is also to be given to the employer and explains how they need to keep students safe.
- **A Workbook**. They need to complete this during the week. We will have a follow up lesson to review their placement on their return to school.
- An Employer Review Form. Employers are asked to review the student's time with them online using Unifrog, but if they would rather do this on paper, they can.

Please remember that:

- students must inform their employer and school if they are not going to be at their placement on any given day.
- Students who do not have a placement (or whose placement is closed on a specific day) must be in school if they are not at heir placement, otherwise this will be an unauthorised absence.

### **Extra-Curricular Sport Payment**

The PE department is offering the opportunity for parents to make a one-time electronic payment of £25 to cover their child's annual extracurricular transport payments.
