



Cyber Girls First – Lancaster University Visit

Communicating Absence/Lateness

Parents and guardians are required to notify the school if their child is absent or will be arriving late. Notification must be provided for each day of absence, including for medical appointments. Absences can be reported from 7:15am each day using a variety of communication methods. These options are outlined below:

- Class Charts messaging service

Leave of Absence Requests (LOA)

Guidance from the government outlines that unless there are exceptional circumstances, requests for leave of absence (including holidays) are unlikely to be authorised. Any unauthorised absence will be recorded on the attendance register and will negatively impact your child's overall attendance percentage.

<u>Understanding the 10 in 10-week rule for unauthorised absences</u>

The government outlines that a Penalty Notice must be considered by a school when a pupil has 10 sessions of unauthorised absence within a rolling 10-school-week period.

- A session is half a school day (10 sessions = 5 full school days)
- The absences can be consecutive or non-consecutive
- The 10-week period can span different terms or school years. This means the monitoring period is "rolling". For example, over a 10-week period, a penalty notice is considered if a child has 6 sessions of unauthorised absence in the previous summer half term and 4 sessions in the first autumn half term.

This section below is part of the 10 in 10-week rule (I was unsure if we can put penalty information in the newsletter)

What happens when a penalty notice is issued?

It is a fine issued to a parent/guardian as an alternative to prosecution

Penalty Notice Fine Details

First Penalty Notice

- £80 if paid within 21 Days
- £160 if paid within 28 Days

Second Penalty Notice (within 3 years for the same child and parent)

• £160(flat rate)

Third Penalty Offence

- No further penalty notice can be issued
- The case must be escalated, often to prosecution





<u>STEM Trip – Big Bang Science Fair in Birmingham</u>


We're all looking forward to entering the competition again next year and hopefully having some pupils up on that stage collecting prizes this time!
















Parent and Student Support - Coffee and Connect at CHS

Lancaster & Morecambe College 'Positive Prospects' Summer Programme

Lancaster and Morecambe College are again running their successful summer programme. It is a great opportunity for young people in Year 10 and Year 11. The programme runs over 3 days, starting at 9am and finishing at 3pm.

The aim of the programme is to give young people the opportunity to experience college when it is quiet and have experience of learning new things and get a feel for college life if they are in the process of thinking about college as their next step. The college can offer young people guidance and advice, as well as fun activities that are focused on learning, building confidence, self-esteem, teamwork, meeting new people and enjoying activities that will support them.

The activities will include, First Aid training, catering, woodwork and more. They are running 3 groups: 29th – 31st July, 5th – 7th August and 19th – 21st August. If anyone is interested, they should complete the link below to register their interest. The college will contact everyone and send them the relevant documentation and dates they will be allocated. If any young person has a particular week, they prefer they should state this when they send the register of interest form back. Carnforth High School Shine at Cricket Tournament

Carnforth High School's girls' cricket team recently took part in an exciting tournament, competing against OLCC A and B teams, as well as Lancaster Girls' Grammar School (LGGS). The team came into the competition ready for a challenge—and they delivered.

Match 1: CHS vs. Our Lady's A

In their opening game, CHS drew the short straw by batting first—but that didn't slow them down. Erin impressed early on with some spectacular shots, hitting multiple boundaries before having to retire. Amelia also contributed with strong batting, helping CHS post a competitive score. While Our Lady's A started well with the bat, CHS's fielding was top-tier, keeping the pressure high. The game ended with a convincing win: CHS 61 – 43 OLCC A. Erin was deservedly named Player of the Match.

Match 2: CHS vs. LGGS

CHS were once again put in to bat first. The opening four batters quickly reached their retirement scores after several powerful boundary hits. Lizzy had an outstanding performance, scoring 24 runs in just five overs. When LGGS stepped up to bat, Erin bowled with precision, conceding just two runs in her five overs. The rest of the team backed her up with solid bowling and fielding, restricting LGGS to 67 runs. Another win for CHS: CHS 95 – 67 LGGS, with Erin once again earning Player of the Match.

Match 3: CHS vs. Our Lady's B

By the final match, confidence was high. Batting first yet again, CHS showed their depth, with Amelia and Lexi-Sky both retiring early after reaching the scoring limit thanks to excellent batting. The exact score was kept secret until the end, adding to the suspense. However, CHS's superb fielding made the result clear, as they bowled out 4x OLCC B players before completing all overs. Final score: CHS 87 – 65 OLCC B. Erin capped off a fantastic day by being named Player of the Match for the 3rd time.



<u>Track and Field Cup – Regional Qualifier</u>

Students from Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 competed at the regional qualifier of the Track and Field Cup at Stanley Park, Blackpool. Students made up teams for junior and inter boys and girls. The standard of competition at this event is very high, with schools all across Lancashire competing to qualify for the regional finals and subsequent national finals.

There were a number of standout individual performances, but it was just as pleasing to see all students compete with confidence across a range of events against high quality opposition.





The junior girls scored 137 points; Ella scored a huge 19 points for the team total, running the 1500m in 6:06 minutes. Jasmine scored 14 points, running the 800m in 3:10 minutes. Mabel scored 11 points, running the 100m in 15.1. The junior boys scored 253 points, Dan and Jack scored 11 points each in the 100m running 14.2 seconds and 14.0 seconds respectively. Xav scored 12 points, running the 200m in 30.2 seconds. Dan scored 16 points, with a huge shotput distance of 8.93m. Joe and Jacob both scored 19 points each on the track. Jacob with a time of 5:11 minutes in the 1500m and Joe with an 800m result of 2:34 minutes. Joe also scored 15 points on the triple jump, jumping 9.35m.

Well done to all junior athletes, who competed well but also learnt a lot about what it is like to take part in a full day athletics event. The junior boys narrowly missed out on a place in the B final.







The inter girls scored 159 points; Eden scored the highest number of points with 15 points in the 300m. Winning the race in 49.4 seconds. Mary scored 11 points, running the 800m in 3:05 minutes. Olivia scored 12 points, with a time of 3:02 minutes in the same event. Erin scored 12 points in the triple jump, jumping 8.46m. The inter boys scored 268 points in total, with a lot of excellent performances. Stand out results were Thomas scored 17 points on the hurdles in 13.6 seconds. Dan scored 16 points, with a 100m sprint in 12.7 seconds. Kenzie and Theo both scored 13 points, with almost identical runs in the 200m, of 27.2 and 27.3 seconds. George and Bobby both performed really well in the 800m, Bobby scoring 16 points with a time of 2:29 minutes and George 18 points with a time of 2:25 minutes. Rob scored 18 points in the high jump, with a height of 1.56m. The 4x100m relay team of Archie, Gabriel, George and Alfie scored 14 points, getting the baton around in 54.4 seconds. Well done to all the students who represented school superbly, we now look forward to the upcoming district athletics on Wednesday 9th July.







Upcoming Event – District Athletics

District athletics takes place at Salt Ayre on Wednesday 9th July. Team sheets are now up, and students should know if they have been selected and what event they will be competing in. Students will have received a letter, which is due to PE by Thursday 3rd July.

Students selected are encouraged to attend athletics practice on Tuesday 1st and Tuesday 8th July.



Extra-Curricular Sport Payment

The PE department is offering the opportunity for parents to make a one-time electronic payment of £25 to cover their child's annual extracurricular transport payments. Currently the PE department charges £1 for home fixtures and £2 for away fixtures; this covers a percentage of cost for transport and competition fees. Parents will be able to make the payment on the School Gateway. It is hoped that parents find this a preferential method of payment, for those students who are regular team members, rather than paying in cash on the day of the fixtures.
